A RESOLUTION

Directing the Center for Rural Pennsylvania to study the 1 potential for increased residential, commercial and 2 industrial natural gas distribution infrastructure by 3 Pennsylvania's public utilities to unserved and underserved 5 areas of this Commonwealth. 6 WHEREAS, Over the past several years, Pennsylvania consumers have benefited from substantially lower and more stable natural gas prices due to the development of technologies that allow 8 energy producers to access significant supplies of domestic natural gas from shale formations and other unconventional 10 11 reservoirs; and 12 WHEREAS, In 2010, as a result of this technology, 13 Pennsylvania's natural gas production more than quadrupled and became the 5th largest in the United States behind Texas, 14 15 Wyoming, West Virginia and Louisiana; and 16 WHEREAS, Despite the recent production levels of natural gas 17 in Pennsylvania, this Commonwealth continues to lack the natural 18 gas distribution infrastructure needed to supply this valuable

resource to a majority of Pennsylvanians in rural and urban

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- 1 communities; and
- 2 WHEREAS, The United States Census Bureau estimates that only
- 3 51% of Pennsylvania homes are heated with natural gas, and that
- 4 in 49% of Pennsylvania's municipalities, less than 25% of the
- 5 homes are heated by natural gas; and
- 6 WHEREAS, The lack of natural gas service is a hardship for
- 7 citizens in this Commonwealth who are required to purchase more
- 8 expensive heating sources as a result of a lack of natural gas
- 9 distribution infrastructure; and
- 10 WHEREAS, The extension and expansion of natural gas
- 11 distribution infrastructure is critically important to providing
- 12 consumers with the best energy value now and into the future;
- 13 and
- 14 WHEREAS, The lack of natural gas service is also contributing
- 15 to a lack of economic development in this Commonwealth; and
- 16 WHEREAS, If extended and expanded, the natural gas
- 17 distribution infrastructure can significantly improve the
- 18 economic climate in this Commonwealth; and
- 19 WHEREAS, Encouraging the extension and expansion of natural
- 20 gas will further benefit consumers, provide new jobs and lead to
- 21 lower net emissions of carbon dioxide, nitrogen oxide and sulfur
- 22 dioxide; and
- 23 WHEREAS, The General Assembly has long supported sustainable
- 24 resource development and balanced efforts to ensure the delivery
- 25 of energy resources in an environmentally responsible manner
- 26 that benefits Pennsylvanians; and
- 27 WHEREAS, The extension and expansion of natural gas
- 28 distribution infrastructure will improve consumer satisfaction,
- 29 provide for increased economic development opportunities and
- 30 create jobs in this Commonwealth; therefore be it

- 1 RESOLVED, That the Center for Rural Pennsylvania is directed
- 2 to study the extension and expansion of natural gas distribution
- 3 infrastructure by Pennsylvania's public utilities to unserved
- 4 and underserved areas of this Commonwealth by collecting and
- 5 analyzing information on the following:
- 6 (1) the estimated demand for natural gas service in
- 7 unserved and underserved areas of this Commonwealth;
- 8 (2) the estimated price consumers are willing to pay for
- 9 access or conversion to natural gas service;
- 10 (3) the identification of any regional differences in
- 11 consumer demand and willingness to pay for natural gas
- 12 service; and
- 13 (4) any other relevant economic information on the costs
- and benefits to extend and expand natural gas distribution
- 15 infrastructure;
- 16 and be it further
- 17 RESOLVED, That the Center for Rural Pennsylvania shall report
- 18 its findings, plans and recommendations to the General Assembly
- 19 not later than August 1, 2013.
